Introduction

Definition of Key Terms and Concepts

Immigrant cultural invasion: The process through which the cultural values, norms, and beliefs of immigrant populations are introduced, weakened or enrich, and possibly replaced by those of indigenous populations.

Values, Norms, and Beliefs: Refers to the indigenous or original population's cultural customs, beliefs, and values in a certain geographical area or region that are passed down from one generation to the next.

Sociological research study: The scientific investigation of social connections, institutions, and cultures. It investigates how communities are constituted and how people and groups interact within society.

Cultural diversity: The presence of several ethnic or cultural communities in a given society.

Perceived impact: The subjective assessment of the prospective or actual impacts of a certain phenomenon or event as perceived by someone or group encountering it.

Mitigation measures: This is the practice of defining strategies or mechanisms for minimizing the negative impacts or repercussions of a specific event, activity, or occurrence.

Section II: Academic Literature Review

Furthermore, cultural change opposition can be exploited for

political reasons, resulting in xenophobia, prejudice, and social disintegration. Cultural

integration can thrive by promoting cross-cultural understanding through education and social programs while still creating opportunities for immigrants to participate in civic and community engagements.

Overcoming the negative impacts of cultural invasion of the indigenous culture of the UK by immigrants requires the UK government to create policies and initiatives that enhance social integration. According to (Lewis, 2019), the government needs to initiate programs that support language classes, job training, and housing assistance for immigrants. cultural insecurity and uncertainty among indigenous people who feel that their way of life is threatened. The potential for conflict between different cultural groups is high, especially when there is a huge cultural gap between immigrant and indigenous people (Haynes, 2020). Common issues such as dress codes, religious beliefs, and gender roles are some of the cultural aspects by immigrants that can destabilize normal values and norms of the host society's cultures leading to cultural conflict include.

Theme Five: Attitudes Towards Immigrants

The theme of attitudes toward immigrants in this research study will explore the narratives constructed by the indigenous people towards immigrants based on their feelings and perceptions. In the United Kingdom, opinions toward immigration range from friendly and accommodating to hostile and bigoted (Titzmann and Lee, 2022). Some perceive immigrants as beneficial to the country's cultural variety and economy, whereas others see them as a danger to their standards of life and social cohesiveness. Cultural invasion suggests that immigrants impose their values, customs, and beliefs on indigenous peoples, which can cause resentment and conflict (Favell, 2022).
